Tetanus bacteria are found in soil, manure, soil dust, contaminated nails, wire, scissors, razors, and agricultural tools.

Spores of the bacterium enter the body through cuts/wounds on the hands, feet, AND umbilical cord, etc. The disease develops when spores enter the body and reach the nervous system.

The disease causes severe pain and muscle contractions and can be fatal.

How to Prevent Tetanus?

Wear protective clothing such as gloves and shoes to prevent possible infections.

If injured during manual work or bitten by an animal while working with soil, wash the affected area with water and soap without delay and visit the nearest healthcare facility.



Pregnant women can consult their family physicians, Migrant Health Centers, Foreigners' Policlinics (where MHCs are not available), and Community Health Centers for tetanus vaccination.

Women aged 45 to 49 must receive a minimum of three doses of tetanus vaccine.





How to Prevent Tetanus Disease Before and After Childbirth?

Tetanus is preventable with timely vaccination

- → Births must take place in hospital settings.
- → Pregnant women should be vaccinated against tetanus to prevent neonatal tetanus deaths (in the first 28 days).

The first dose should be administered after the fourth month of pregnancy.

The second should be administered one month before or after birth at the latest.

The third dose should be administered 6 months after birth

The fourth dose should be administered one year after the third dose regardless of pregnancy status.

The fifth dose should be administered one year after the fourth dose regardless of pregnancy status.

Vaccination cards should be stored safely and produced to healthcare personnel when requested.
